A RESOLUTION DECLARING TYLER PARK NEIGHBORHOOD ASSOCIATION

#### A COMPASSIONATE NEIGHBORHOOD

WHEREAS, Mayor Greg Fischer has made compassion one of the three foundational pillars of his administration; and,

WHEREAS, on November 11, 2011, the Mayor signed a Resolution adopted by the Louisville Metro Council declaring Louisville a Compassionate City and embarking on a 10-year campaign of compassionate outreach; and,

In this way, Kristi or any of the instructors will know your skill level, and thus make sure that you attend an appropriate level class. student of yoga for many years. It has become part of who I am, and how I function.


Ms. Fulkerson has supported the Tyler Park Neighborhood with contributions and advertising. She tells me that she estimates she contributed about

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## Tyler Park Master Plan Update

#### 1. Bollard Replacement

Sheila Pitts of Metro Parks and her crew completed replacing the wooden bollards that were missing from the Tyler Parkway and Tyler Park Drive intersection and at other locations within the park. The crew removed the old concrete footers with a backhoe, then poured new concrete footers for the new bollards. The costs for this portion of the work is covered by Metro Parks.

Two removable steel bollards have been fabricated by Metro Parks metal shop. Riverside Paving installed the bollards at the beginning of December.

Riverside will also finish grading the area around the pathway entry to remove the vehicle ruts. Then they will seed and straw. They will also install 50 linear feet of new asphalt curbing to prevent parking between the crosswalks of the Tyler Park and Tyler Parkway intersection. This portion of the work is being completed with the council district funds. Thank you, Tom Owen.

At publication deadline, this work was not yet completed.

#### 2. Tree Planting in the area of the new walkway

There has been a very exciting development regarding the tree planting. Metro Parks received a grant from MSD for tree planting within the areas of the city with combined storm and sanitary sewers (CSO). Since Tyler Park is in that area, Metro Parks is able to purchase 12 new canopy trees using the MSD funds -to be planted in the area of the new walk. Parks also plans to purchase 3 new flowering understory trees for the woodland area where the redbuds were planted last spring. The shade trees will be 2-1/2" in caliper and the understory trees will be slightly smaller- about 2" in caliper. The canopy tree species include (6) Shumard Oaks, (2) Post Oaks, (2) Burr Oaks, and (2) Cucumber Magnolias. The understory trees will be native dogwoods. Metro Parks will purchase, plant and maintain the trees. Thank you to Martha Berner, Metro Parks landscape architect for keeping Tyler Park in mind when this grant became available. The trees were to be planted after leaf drop. You may have noticed the flags have been in place on the walkway hill since November.

At publication deadline this work was not yet completed.

#### 3. Pathway Furnishings

The estimate to complete this portion of the walkway project is \$13,565.00. This includes 2 benches and two trash receptacles, mortared limestone retaining walls, grading and concrete work for bench pads and retaining wall foundations. TPNA is fund raising to complete this portion of the project. -- Joan Dubay



### Tyler Park Maintenance

Three percent of the Louisville city budget goes to Metro Parks. Metro Parks maintains 123 parks. Seventy three of those parks are in the West District, supervised by Mark Wilson. Thirteen of those 73 parks fall into the Cherokee District, supervised by Sheila Pitts. Tyler Park is in the Cherokee District.

Sheila has eight full time employees

and a crew supervisor that maintain those thirteen parks and mowing areas from "I-264 East, Farnsley Park to Downtown, Ballard Park". During most of the year the crews work all seven days. They are divided into shifts working Sunday to Thursday and Tuesday to Saturday. Two men just run the big mowers. So now we are down to six employees who do everything else. Did I mention that one of the parks is Cherokee? A staff that size could spend all day everyday in Cherokee Park. The staff is spread thin.

Mark and Sheila showed me a huge dry erase board with the names of all the parks and areas permanently listed. In another column dates are recorded when, for example, mowing/mulching have taken place. With one glance Sheila knew where the crews are and what they are doing and which park needs attention next. The equipment and tools were all just so. The floor was spotless. Outside, the picnic tables were upended in a precise line. All the machinery was wiped down and parked in its place. This lady runs one tight ship.

Each park in the Cherokee District is visited by a rotating crew of two. Tyler Park's daily maintenance schedule (excluding the weekends on the winter schedule) include:

Empty and pick up trash Blow off the "hardscapes" (paths, under the bridge) Check for graffiti (all vulgar graffiti must be removed within 48 hours)

Clear the grills Check the drains and spray pools Clean the restrooms

The crew has a log and records their activities daily. Some days work may take longer in one park than another depending on it's condition. Each day Sheila receives input from Metro Call and perhaps her supervisor. According to Mark, that crew of two are, "The eyes and ears and true heroes of park maintenance." Sheila communicates with other departments including the events. Hauling all those picnic tables somewhere and then cleaning up after an event disrupts the regular schedule. Sheila flashed a big smile smile. The woman will get the job done.

Some situations need to be referred to Central Services that handles all the skilled jobs like plumbing, electrical work, heavy equipment, or signs. At times Forestry or Landscaping needs to be called in. Sheila may need to contact MSD, Public Works, Department of Transportation, Olmsted, or LMPD.

Basically Sheila is juggling all of these unknowns everyday for thirteen parks. Mark is prioritizing for seventy three parks. Mark and Sheila couldn't be any more pleasant and willing to co-operate with the neighborhood and TPNA. They put the meaning in the words public servants.

Mark is semi-retired from a forty year career in golf, the last twenty two years at Valhalla. He pursued a job in parks as "a way to give back to the city that's given me a lot." He has been employed by Metro Parks since April. Mark's brother-in-law, Tony, lives on Goddard so he is very familiar with Tyler Park.

Sheila has been with Metro Parks for eight years coming from Bellarmine. She knows Tyler Park as well. Sheila referred to herself as a "country girl", one of twenty two children. "When I was little and it rained, we would all run outside in bathing suits and play in the puddles. I just love parks, especially the spray pools. I wonder why would anyone want to tear up something as beautiful as a park. I just love when I see one of my parks with no graffiti, grills going, everybody playing."

"We don't like vandalism and graffiti in our wy parks," added Mark. "It makes us react. We are all about maintaining, improving the parks. We

It became obvious to me that Metro Parks has limited staff and resources. Tyler Park is well used, well loved, and well worn. Mark and Sheila encourage us to continue to take ownership of Tyler Park. Call Metro Park (311) if there's a problem and be sure to compliment the workers. *-- Joan Dubay* 

## Who Owns the Tyler Park Bridge?



The most obvious manmade structure in Tyler Park is the Baxter Avenue bridge - viaduct. This structure bisects Tyler Park as an elevated roadway carrying a substantial traffic load north and south in the Highlands but the park below the road level is hardly effected by the traffic. The area remains peaceful and quiet even during the rush

hours of Louisville, an ideal respite for the neighborhood residents. For these reasons it is a very important structure, but one that normally remains in the background of the neighborhood activities.

The bridge - viaduct really consists of 3 structures: the north elevated highway (viaduct), the bridge itself over the pedestrian walkway that joins the two sides of the park, and the south viaduct. It was built in the early part of the last century and has been designated a city landmark. The north and south viaducts are build of large, rough cut, limestone blocks that may weigh as much as 4 or 5 tons each. The bridge over the walkway is also made of limestone blocks but these pieces are smaller and better finished. The blocks are not only decorative but also form the structure of the bridge itself, there is no structural steel supporting the roadway.

Tyler Park Neighborhood Association has become interested in which organization is responsible for the maintenance of this vital structure, ie "Who owns the bridge?" It has been determined that since Baxter Avenue is Kentucky State Route 1703, it falls upon the state to maintain the highway surface. The bridge itself is also inspected biannually by the state for structural adequacy. These activities are performed by the Kentucky Transportation Cabinet District 05 office.

However KYTC does not take responsibility for the rest of the structure consisting of the north and south viaduct structures, sidewalks, railings, drainage, and plantings. These responsibilities seem to reside with the metro district, but it is not immediately clear which departments take ownership. It seems that the structure has been so reliable and trouble free over the last century that it has been ignored. City responsibility seems to have fallen into limbo. There are several concerns with the parts of the structure that are not maintained by the state. Perhaps the most obvious is the degraded mortar between the large limestone blocks of the viaducts. Other concerns are trees growing at the foundation line of the bridge and viaducts, vines on the viaducts, and low point drainage from Baxter Ave and under the bridge.

There is to be a meeting sponsored by Councilman Tom Owen's Office with city department representatives to determining who is responsible to assess these and other questions and assign responsibility for inspection and repair in the future. TPNA will be part of this meeting and will keep track of the designated city agencies for each area. As this information becomes available it will be brought out in TPNA meetings and in this newsletter, *The Neighborhood Bridge*. TPNA is intent that the Tyler Park bridge continue to serve the community for decades to come. -- *Doug Thrasher*

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## **Tyler Park Centennials**

The original idea for this article was to anticipate the 100-year anniversaries our neighborhood should be having in 2014. Martha Elson from the *Courier-Journal* has reported on several in recent articles. It turns out, though, we're even older than we thought.


Three anniversaries have just been celebrated in or near our neighborhood. A block to our east, the Cherokee Triangle Association celebrated the 100 years that the statue of General John Castleman and his mare Caroline has been keeping watch over the Cherokee Parkway. Inside our boundaries, the St. James Church celebrated 100 years of use for its signature yellow brick building. A block to our south, the St. Agnes school celebrated its 100<sup>th</sup>.

Here's the difficulty: the actual events that were celebrated took place on November 8 and December 21 in 1913 and on January 5 in 1914. By the time we go to press the celebrations will have already taken place. Worse yet, the events were among the last clearly identifiable points of reference for our early history. By the time Tyler Park's children started at St. Agnes, the bridge was built (late December 1904), the park was named (February 5, 1907), most of our roads were in place, and, generally, the neighborhood had started its normal day-by-day life.

We can celebrate any day we want, of course, but invitations asking people to please come because something might have happened here more or less on this date 100 years ago just seem sort of vague.

In fact the next noteworthy centennial is probably the incorporation of our Association's predecessor, the Tyler Park Club, which was approved on July 5, 1914. For several years after that, big events were elsewhere while Louisville and the rest of the globe dealt with a world war.

The original idea of listing upcoming 100-year anniversaries only gets us a short list. So here is my proposal: if you have a centennial event that you would like mentioned to the community, send an email to brtpna@iglou.com. We will be having a planning meeting in February and maybe we can get our own little celebration put together. -- © 2013 Ray Brundige


