#### From the ValuMarket Deli

For the fifth year, ValuMarket donated the food and related labor for Tyler Park Neighborhood's Wine Event. This year the donation was worth \$3518. What a wonderful gift to all of us!

We asked Melissa Carpenter, the deli manager, to share some of her recipes and suggest some specialties that the ValuMarket deli can prepare. There are plans to make this a continuing TPNA newsletter feature.

Some popular items served at the Wine event were the mini Hot Browns and the Pimento Cheese Stuffed Mushrooms. These and other items can be made specially for you with 48 hour notice. While Melissa isn't sharing these recipes, she did say that the turkey used was from the rotisserie and is available daily from the deli.

Try their specialty cakes and desserts; the Italian Cream Cake and the freshly made Cannoli are great for parties and smaller gatherings. These are made from scratch and available from their pastry chef with prior notice.

One cheese being featured at ValuMarket's cheese counter is the Lavender Cheddar, which combines imported organic French lavender blossoms with a creamy, buttery cheese curd for a balanced cheddar, producing a mild sweet flavor and a mysterious floral back note. Try it over roasted lamb or on chicken or turkey. This cheese will give a Provincial twist to your recipes.

Another cheese to check out is Kerry Gold Dubliner. It is a robust, aged cow's milk cheese with a bit of hard texture similar to a cheddar. Taste the diversity of flavors from nutty sharp to sweet.



Melissa did share the recipe she uses for her pimento cheese for those who are interested in making their own. The portions have been adjusted for a home batch.

#### PIMENTO CHEESE

3 ounces cream cheese
1 cup grated sharp cheese
1 cup grated monterey jack
1/2 cup mayonnaise
3 Tablespoons pimentos, smashed
1 teaspoon grated onion
Cracked black pepper, salt, and garlic powder to taste

Using a food processor blend cream cheese until smooth and fluffy. Add all of the ingredients and beat until well blended.

#### Clean Streets are the Home Owners' Responsibility!

At a recent TPNA board meeting one of the board members asked Terra Long, Councilman Tom Owen's assistant, why it is that Tyler Park Neighborhood streets are swept in early October as opposed to later in the year when our streets are littered with leaves? Terra's response came in two parts. "Your neighborhood



streets are swept by the city per an established schedule. However, it is the home owners' responsibility to maintain their side of the street free of debris and especially keep any sewer drains on their side free of debris so rain water can flow uninterrupted." Terra also emphasized that the same applies to the alleys.

What this means is that if we really want our streets, sidewalks and alleys to be clean and tidy we need to take the initiative and do it ourselves. Many of us have gotten lax lately and some of our streets, sidewalks and alleys are still littered with fall leaves and even garbage. Does that not bother you? One of TPNA's main missions is to advocate for the beautification of our neighborhood. One of the easiest, lowest cost ways to make our neighborhood beautiful is to keep our sidewalks, alleys and streetscapes tidy. Now that the weather has turned for the better and the Derby festivities are just around the corner, it is an opportune time to go out and clean up our public areas. Remember, it is OUR responsibility to do so. Also, please be a good neighbor and assist those who physically or economically cannot do their share. #### Invasive Weed Clean-Ups at Tyler Park with Olmsted Park Conservancy



The TPNA has arranged four invasive weed cleanups with the leadership of the Olmsted Parks Conservancy for this year. The dates are April 23, June 25, September 17, and November 5. These

will involve cutting down and then cutting the weeds into smaller pieces to speed decomposition. All neighbors who are interested are invited to participate. Some of the work can be strenuous, but there are activities for all ability levels. The Olmsted staff will once again be in charge of spraying the cut stems to help prevent regrowth of the weeds. We have worked quite a bit on the hillside along Tyler Park Drive opposite the playground and along the walking path to the small parking lot. We have made lots of progress there, but there are still some large clumps of bush honeysuckle to remove. Other work could involve mulching, algae removal, and working on trees and shrubs, so come dressed for whatever you might get into. We meet beside the park along Tyler Park Drive near the stone steps leading into the park at about 8:30. TPNA is an official adopter of Tyler Park, and one of our duties is regular park clean-ups. 

The TPNA has a Zoning and Enforcement Committee that responds to hearings set up by the Bardstown Road Overlay Committee and the Board of Zoning Adjustment. The recent economic slowdown resulted in almost no hearings related to our neighborhood until January, when we had two scheduled. The first, on January 4, involved a proposal to connect two buildings at 1279 and 1283 Bardstown Road (Highlands Tap Room and a vacant building). These buildings are in the Cherokee Triangle neighborhood, but are very visible in ours. The proposal calls for a small addition at the rear of the two buildings to connect them, facilitating kitchen service to both and allowing the Tap Room to have one site primarily for a bar and one for a restaurant, possibly with different hours for both. The building facades are to be redone, featuring more glass. The existing patio at 1279 will be removed, and a new one will be added to 1283 as a dining patio. The basic structures will remain, as will their rooflines. Skylights will be added to the connector, and the roofing will be consistent with the main buildings. Details to be ironed out include landscaping, signage, and vent fan placement, but the proposal appeared to be heading for approval.

The second case was heard on January 11th, but I was unable to attend due to the bad weather. I did have a phone conversation with a city official heading up the case. It involves Skyline Chili near Mid City Mall. This building (remember when it was slated to be a Popeye's Fried Chicken??) was built in the 1980's and no longer fits the Skyline Chili image. There are exterior and interior modifications proposed, along with added windows, roof line changes, and a proposed dining patio in front. All the proposed changes meet with Bardstown Road Overlay Committee recommendations and this proposal, too, appears headed for approval, according to the official.

Our Zoning and Enforcement Committee is another way for area residents to volunteer to help our neighborhood. There are occasional meetings, as outlined above, and all attendees are invited to provide input to the BROC during these meetings.
