

TPNA PARTICIPATES IN RIVERFRONT REUNION

BOARD OF ALDERMEN APPROVES \$49,800 FOR TYLER PARK IMPROVEMENTS

The Playground. The Louisville Board of Aldermen recently approved \$19,800 for playground equipment and improvements. This money will be combined with \$1,350 of TPNA money to thoroughly renovate the Tot Lot (including a new mulch play base), to install lots of new equipment in the lower park (including an "Exerglide," a special swing that holds a wheelchair for handicapped children), and to repaint the equipment which still has some life in it.

Who to Thank. Once again, many thanks to Joan Dubay (and her committee, which includes David Bell, Connolly, Vickie Vickie Schweickhardt, and Saelinger) for selecting equipment and going through the proper channels with the City to make this happen. If all goes well, the equipment should be installed by October 1. Many sincere thanks also to Mike Carrell, 3d Ward Alderman, for shepherding the project through the city budgeting process to a successful conclusion. Seriously, if you have (or know) a child who will benefit from the playground equipment improvements, take a few minutes and write Mike a thank-you note c/o City Hall, 601 West Jefferson, Louisville, KY 40202.

Tennis Courts. The city has also allocated \$30,000 to resurface the Tyler Park tennis courts this year, and the TPNA Board, at its July meeting, allocated \$650 to a special reserve fund for future repairs to the new equipment. So by this Fall, the park will look even better.

Your support, through annual membership dues, supporting the picnic, and buying raffle tickets, has helped make this happen. Thank you. You can help keep our new equipment in good shape by discouraging older children from using (or abusing) it.

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UNSAFE SIDEWALKS FIXED FOR FREE

As reported in The Courier-Journal on July 28, the Board of Aldermen recently approved an additional \$250,000 (on top of an initial \$300,000) to help property owners repair unsafe sidewalks in front of their properties. Money is lent as a "forgivable loan," which the property owner pays back only if he/she moves within five years of the repair. There are no limits on a property owner's income to qualify.

If you have an unsafe sidewalk in front of your property (and there are several in the neighborhood), call the Department of Public Works at 587-3121 to inquire about getting it fixed for free.

OPERATION BRIGHTSIDE'S PROJECT PICKUP BEGINS MONDAY, AUGUST 18

First, we should report that the first phase of Operation Brightside, Project Blitz, was a huge success in the Tyler Park neighborhood. Thanks to the rallying efforts of TPNA board members Mike Zoeller and Ellen and Kelly McKnight, about 150 residents showed up on the appointed day—five times more than in any other neighborhood to date. We managed to fill seven dumpsters twice, ranking second in overall tonnage of junk removed.

Next comes Project Pickup. This program replaces the semiannual junk pickup weeks we used to have, when we could put junk at curbside. Instead, starting at 6:00 AM on Monday, August 18, and continuing on each third Monday after that, residents can put up to three oversized pieces of junk (appliances, tires, furniture, etc.) out with their normal trash. 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LOUISVILLE KIDS NEED FOSTER HOMES

The Kentucky Cabinet for Human Resources, Department of Special Services, desperately needs additional foster homes in the Louisville area. Currently, 67 children

are waiting for placement.

The 67 children include: infants (one black and one white); one biracial teenage boy; one teenage boy of Asian heritage; 14 black males and 13 black females, and 20 white males and 7-18; white females, ages 3-18. Only 14 of the 67 children are under the age of 11; the greatest need is for families willing to accept teenagers into their hearts and homes.

Foster parents can generally expect a child placed with them to remain in their home for a maximum of 18 months. During that time, aside from providing a home and love to a child in need, foster parents work with social workers toward the goal of reuniting the child with his or her natural family.

People eligible to become foster parents are between the ages of 21 and 65, in good health, and financially able to support themselves.
