If the budget for the Louisville Free Public Libraryis not increased, there will be drastic cuts in library services at our neighborhood branch - the Highland Library. The branch hours will e reduced from 45 to 35 weekly. The library branch will close on Mondays and will be able to open only one evening per week.

Cuts will extend to staff levels as well. There may be one staffmember position eliminated. This will mean that the remaining staff will have no days off and will have to work on Saturdays.

The part-time Children's Librarian position will be eliminated, so this means that there will be no children's services after July 1 at our branch.




Ditto's -another Tyler Park success!

Just after the turn of the century, people must have walked past the new car dealership at 1114 Bardstown Road and thought the Tyler Park neighborhood was really coming along.

Today, the location is host to a new, beautiful restaurant and once again, the Tyler Park neighborhood is really coming along. It's <u>Ditto's</u> - a great addition to Louisville's "restaurant row." Owners Frank Yangl and Dominic Serratore have built a truly great neighborhood restaurant - and they opened Ditto's in our neighborhood.

When asked what they drew upon to assemble such an impressive place, Mr. Serratore said "we took our architect to Chicago and showed him a few of our favorite places - 'Scuzi' and others. We wanted a place where real people would feel comfortable. The kind of place that a family of four or a couple on a date could both enjoy."

With the experience that both drew from working as chefs at Casa Grisanti, the two knew that careful planning was crucial to Ditto's success. Mr. Yangl and Mr. Serratore early on sought the Tyler Park Neighborhood Association's help in gaining a zoning variance for a parking lot. Last October they approached your Board and explained their request. After careful discussion, the Board decided that the use of



the adjacent lot would be in the neighborhood's best interest.

And Ditto's has proven quite an improvement. Walk in and you're in a space that is both large and airy. The scale seems larger-than-life. Large booths can easily seat six and tables are flanked on three sides with deep, soft benches that can seat the whole family. They're so large that the waiters have to use a step just to reach the back of the table!

The menu seems large as well. It ranges from appetizers to cosmopolitan entrees. Interested in light fare? Personal pizzas with hand-pulled dough offer delightful toppings-alight, delicate blend of four cheeses or crusty pepperoni - they're sure to hit the spot. Miss your Mom's cooking? Try the salmon croquettes. More exotic fare includes chinese burritos. You're sure to find something you'll like, whether favorite or unusual.

They keep promising a "blue-plate special" but so far it hasn't been available. We hope it arrives soon.

The new Sunday bruch is a hit - the crowds waiting outside the day after Derby proved the Often you won't wait long for a table. Ten minutes or so pass quickly - look at work by local artist Marvin Finn or just revel in such a beautiful restaurant. The rear of the building is empty now, but it will feature a take-out deli and bakery. It's another reason why everyone will be going to Ditto's!

We're proud Mr. Serratore and Mr. Yangl decided to open Ditto's in the Tyler Park neighborhood. We're glad that we could in some small way help make Ditto's possible. Tell your friends about your neighborhood's newest restaurant.

Alderman Tom Owen's report:

"impleased with the proposed new Letail development on the former White Castle site at the intersection of Bardstown Road and Eastern Parkway. There will be five or six shops - mostly fronting on Eastern Parkway - with thirty-seven parking spaces. The center will generate more traffic, but we'll all enjoy the new shops and be glad to see the vacant site filled.

With Fifth Ward Alderman Steve Magre's help, I've arranged funding for a new zoning plan for the Tyler Park neighborhood. The planning commission staff will propose a lower zoning for larger lots that are being used for singlefamily dwellings but now carry a more dense zoning designation. We'll have a chance to comment on their recommendations, and the Board of Aldermen must approve any zoning change.

I've asked for money to update our 1980 Tyler Park plan. This is the blueprint for placing play equipment and other amenities in the Park through the end of the century.

Finally, cheers to those residents participating in the city's pilot curbside recycling program. I love seeing your orange baskets at the weekly garbage pickup sites. The rest of us

who have not been phased-in to the curbside pickups should please take our metal and aluminum cans, plastic beverage bottles, clear glass and newspapers to a city drop-off site or a commercial buy-back center. Call Citycall at 625-3333 for more details. Earth kindness is very wise and very satisfying.

See you at Tyler Park on June 16 for our annual neighborhood picnic. There'll be plenty to do for both the young and the young at heart. Remember that our picnic profits pay for all kinds of Tyler Park neighborhood projects.

Membership drive update

The membership drive for 1990-1991 is underway. Your \$ 5.00 membership dues are important. The dues are used by your Tyler Park Neighborhood Association to fund the picnic and the Easter Egg Hunt as well as maintaining the quality of the park in general. Your dues also pay for the production and mailing of the Tyler Park Quarterly.

Your dues are paid back to you in more immediate ways. You'll receive memership discounts at many of our fine area merchants. You'll receive your list of participating merchants when you get your membership card.

This year, we've added a new membership category. The by-laws have been changed to allow individual membership. Each adult member of a household can join the Association for just \$5.00. This means more than one family member can have a discount card, and they'll have one vote at every neighborhood meeting.

We still have the other two categories of membership-Household (\$5.00 dues; one discount card and one vote at neighborhood meetings), and Business (\$10.00 membership).

To date, the dues received this year total \$ 235.00.
