

Please participate in the annual Tyler Park Cleanup by coming down to the park on April 11 at 9:00AM and meeting by the bridge. If we all pitch in, it will not be a big job and the whole neighborhood will benefit.

Identify your property. Engraving items with "KY + Social Security Number" is an effective deterrent to theft.

TPNA WINS "EARTHWORKS" GRANT by Bill Schneider

The Tyler Park Neighborhood Association is the recipient of a grant from "Earthworks," a neighborhood grant program of Operation Brightside. Mayor Jerry Abramson awarded \$660 to the Tyler Park Association for a sidewalk environmental survey of Bardstown Road between Eastern Parkway and Grinstead The project will involve elementary school students in making assessments of how well or how poorly businesses and residences along the corridor maintain their property. Factors such as trash, weeds, broken sidewalks and lack of building maintenance will be considered. Results of the environmental survey will be published later this summer in a special issue of the Tyler Park Neighborhood News. The goal of the project is to promote well-kept attractive properties along this section of Bards-

Neighborhood Environmental Notes...

LEAD POISONING TESTING-- Children between nine month and six years of age living in a house built before 1960 are recommended to be screened for lead poisoning. A lead test is a simple fingerstick, in which a few drops of blood are collected and sent to a laboratory to be analyzed. It is quick, easy and free of charge. For more information, call Louisville-Jefferson County Health Department, 625-6644 and ask for Judy Nielsen. (Old Louisville Information Center Newsletter)

WATER TESTING-- Testing your water is free. If interested in the free water test, call 583-6000. In the morning after the water has sat in the pipes all night (those that have lead solder legal until 1988), the lead content of the water may test slightly higher than the recommended allowance. Running the water a minute, flushing the toilet or taking a shower can flush the pipes. (Old Louisville Information Center Newsletter)

WARNINGS ABOUT LAWN CHEMICALS-- The commercial "lawn care" business (spraying lawns with chemicals to kill unwanted plants and bugs) has grown enormously. Alarm over the possible negative health effects on humans and animals has also been increasing. About 80 to 90 percent of the ingredients in the lawn sprays are "inert" and are not identified on the label of the product. However, federal law permits hazardous chemical wastes to be included in pesticides. These substances are poison, not only to the target species but to humans and other plants and animals as well. PARK IMPROVEMENTS CONTINUE by Bill Schneider

At the request to the Tyler Park Neighborhood Association, Metro Parks has planted 40 new trees in Tyler Park. It is part of an effort to replace older trees than have died or have been damaged by storms and drought. Oaks and maples have been placed along the park's walking paths and on the hillsides which surround the tennis courts.

An information kiosk has been installed near the steps under the bridge. The Tyler Park Neighborhood Association will use this kiosk to advertise neighborhood events and programs being held in Tyler Park. Residents are welcome to post notices on the kiosk's bulletin board.

Later this spring, the playground area will be renovated. New mulch will be spread and other changes will be made to keep the playbase from washing away during the heavy rains.

The Tyler Park Neighborhood Association has worked closely with Metro Parks on improvements to Tyler Park. We wish to thank Jacky Gardner-Sparrow and Jerry Brown of Metro Parks for their help and cooperation in making our park more enjoyable. A special thank you to Alderman Tom Owen for his financial support.

BLOOM ELEMENTARY SCHOOL by Janet Dakan

Elementary, Bloom Breckinridge Elementary, Byck Elementary, Chenoweth Elementary, Hawthorne Elementary and Shelby Elementary are in the Project Renaissance Cluster. Bloom Elementary will continue to offer programs that enhance a student's full range of abilities. The school's primary curriculum will remain unchanged: Kindergarten, ungraded Primary School (ages 5 to 9 with no grade distinctions), Intermediate Program (ages 10 to 11 with grade distinctions of 4 and 5) and Advance Program (ages 7 - 11). Through Project Renaissance, reading assistance will be included for primary students and preparatory studies for the Advance Program will be offered

to qualified six-year olds. Integral parts of the curriculum will be the African-American Studies Center, Pan-African studies, physical education, art, computer instruction (30 unit computer lab), orchestra/band, vocal music and cultural arts. Also, a guidance program, speechlanguage program to help with communication difficulties and an extended-school (during the summer) will be offered.

The Tyler Park Neighborhood is divided between two police districts: the First District is east of Baxter Avenue and the Fifth District is west of Baxter Avenue. Both the First and the Fifth Districts cover the Tyler Park.

The Highland Branch by Janet Dakan

As the co-chair of the Friends of the Highland Branch of the Library, I have been told many things. The residents of the Highlands area do not care if the Highland Branch of the Library is closed! We have not come out in force to meetings, written letters of protest to our alderman, the A District Commissioner, the Mayor or the Librarian; We have not signed petitions. 
