Thanks go to Greg and Catherine Popham and their small army of volunteers for all their hard work organizing such a wonderful event.


TPNA'S HALLOWEEN IN THE PARK

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THUNDER OVER TYLER PARK

Just try to imagine Tyler Park without those tall, beautiful trees. In the 1920's, those trees were short and sparce, which is why Tyler Park was such a great place for a 4th of July fireworks show. Yep, the "Thunder Over Louisville" of the twenties was held in Tyler Park.

The biggest and best of these 4th of July Independence Day celebrations was for all practical purposes the last. It was the 18th Annual Celebration, put on by the "Tyler Park Club" and it occurred in 1929. There was an 11-page "programme" printed, listing all the events scheduled that day from the 10 a.m. Automobile Parade to the Display of Fireworks at 8:30 p.m.

There were sixteen events that day for men, women and children: foot races, dancing exhibitions, a string winding contest for women, a flying exhibition from Bowman Field and lots of music from bands performing on the grand bandstand which was built a few years before. There were free flags for all the children and prizes from local merchants for all the contest winners. Prizes included baseball bats; ten gallons of motor oil; cigars, and silk hose. And two lucky men each won a ton of coal!

At 8:30 p.m., the fireworks were shot off from the east side of the viaduct (Baxter Avenue). The crowd that night was the biggest ever at an estimated 50,000 (Need I remind you that port-opots hadn't been invented yet?).

The 18th Annual Independence Celebration of the Tyler Park Club received national notice. Three months later, on October 29th, 1929, the stock market crashed and the Great Depression began. It was the beginning of the end of Tyler Park's Annual event. The 4th of July festivities had always been funded by donations solicited from residents in a twelve-block area surrounding the park. A much more subdued celebration was held in 1930; it turned out to be the last. On July 1, 1931, a small notice by the Tyler Park Club in the Courier-Journal announced that, due to the continuing economic depression, there would be no 4th of July celebration that year.

We may no longer have fireworks shooting up to the stars every year, but we do have those big, beautiful trees reaching to the clouds every day. Joe Kremer

THE BANDSTAND

In 1924, MTV was not around for musical entertainment, so a bandstand was built in Tyler Park at a staggering cost of \$10,000 (In today's dollars that would be approximatedly umteen billion). It was situated against the Great Wall, next to the tennis court where the kiddie lot is now. It was made of stone similar to the great wall and had rest rooms at ground level while the bandstand was above; this would have been perfect for our musical entertainment at the TPNA Festival. After going unused for years, the bandstand was altered to become a storage room and, in 1960, it was dismantled.

TYLER PARK GETS NEW PICNIC TABLES AND GRILLS

New, permanent picnic tables have been installed in Tyler Park. The five heavy-duty, square metal tables are located on concrete slabs in shaded locations. The tables are plastic coated and built to wishstand abuse.

In addition, two double grills have been placed in the park. One is near the tennis courts and the other in the spary pool area. Concrete slabs have also been put under many of the park's permanent benches where worn areas turned muddy in wet weather.

These improvements by Metro Parks were recommended by the Tyler Park Neighborhood Association and are meant to increase your enjoyment of Tyler Park.

SOME SECURITY TIPS FOR YOUR HOME

HOUSE NUMBERS: House numbers should be visible day and night from the street, and garages located in alleys should be numbered. This is important for the police officer when responding to a complaint.

SHRUBBERY: Is there a clear view of the door? Or, are they hidden by shrubbery. If so, thin the growth so that the burglar is denied the opportunity to work undetected.

HIDING KEYS: An extra Key hidden in a secret location should always be avoided. A burglar knows all the "hiding spots" and will look there for spare keys.
