

# THE FUTURE FUND LAND TRUST

At a recent meeting of the Tyler Park Neighborhood Association. A District County Commissioner Steve Henry made a strong case for the Future Fund Land Trust, which is concerned with the preservation of the land surrounding Floyds Fork. TPNA agreed to support Commisner Henry's dedication to the Land Trust with this space in the News.

Over one hundred years ago, the leaders of our community had the foresight to set aside land for parks. They established the Olmsted Parks system which includes Cherokee, Iroquois and Shawnee Parks. And now, as Jefferson County continues to grow and develop, we see

what a valuable resource these parks have become.

But what has been done in recent years, as urban sprawl continues to spread throughout the rest of the county? "A" District Commissioner Steve Henry saw an opportunity to help preserve one of Jefferson County's most stunning assets, while also providing park land for future generations. That opportunity was the Floyds Fork Corridor.

Floyds Fork is one of Jefferson County's least disturbed streams. A former president of the Tyler Park Neighborhood Association, Henry had seen the condition of Beargrass Creek, which is now mostly a concrete conduit. Seeking to avoid the damage that had been done to Beargrass, he pledged support for Floyds Fork Creek. With the help of many activists, Commissioner Henry created the Future Fund Land Trust in November, 1992.

The Trust is a nonprofit charity, governed by a Board of Directors, which accepts financial donations for the purchase of land along Floyds Fork. In 1993, the Trust was able to purchase more than 700 acres along the creek. Each parcel of land is unique and will serve many different purposes. For example, some of the land will be used for recreation, wetlands preservation and wildlife sanctuaries.

The view of the creek is spectacular, as are the many unusual types of wildlife in the area, which include wild turkeys, red-tailed hawks and beaver. Uncle Pecos will swing out with country and western. And for quieter enjoyment, some of our talented neighbors will play traditional airs in the park while the stage shows roll on.

We will have food. Willy B's will be on hand with rib tickling barbecue and sides and the White Mountain Creamery will bring their delicious ice cream. Balance your meal with ribs in one hand and a cone in the other.

We will have fun. Guided trolley rides will highlight the history and architecture of our neighborhood. The rides will run from the main entrance to the park between 4:30 and 6:30.
