



EDITORIAL



HEARTY MINESTRONE Recipe of the Month

- 1 chopped onion
- 1 clove garlic
- 2 Toil (optional)
- 1 zucchini, sliced
- 3 stalks celery, sliced
- 2 carrots, diced
- 2 potatoes, diced
- 2 cups coarsely chopped cabbage
- 3 cups beans drained (1 can each of garbanzo and great northern)
- 1 large can diced tomatoes with juice
- 3 T tomato paste
- 2 quarts broth (non-fat chicken or vegetable)
- 2 T chopped parsley
- 1 bay leaf basil, oregano, and thyme to taste




Saute onion and garlic in oil. You may omit this step to remove the fat. Combine the remaining ingredients in a large pot and simmer for one hour. Serve with grated parmesan cheese. This recipe serves about 6 people. To serve more you can add more of each vegetable, an extra can of beans or tomatoes, and extra broth (plain water, tomato juice, or V-8 will do) always helps stretch it out.
