Louisville Orchestra Headlines Tyler Park Fall Festival

Sunday, September 12th
Special appearances include Tony Myers and Tim Krekel

The Louisville Orchestra will perform in Tyler Park on Sunday, September 12th to celebrate of the 100 Year Anniversary the Tyler Park Bridge built in 1904 and is the highlight of the Tyler Park Neighborhood Association annual Fall Festival. This year's festival will focus on MUSIC! MUSIC! MUSIC to showcase the Fredrick Law Olmsted designed park and the natural acoustics that make Tyler Park a favorite musical venue for the entire community. To complete the celebration, Mayor Jerry Abramson's MUSIC IN THE METRO is providing two additional acts: Tony Myers and the Old Louisville Express, and Louisville favorite Tim Krekel.

Special parking arrangements are available for what is expected to be a large turnout. Free parking for the event is available at the Urban Government Center at 810 Barret Avenue in the back parking lot across Vine Street. Free Trolley Service will provide transportation to Tyler Park for the Orchestra Concert and The Music In The Metro Concert. Our thanks to Councilman Tom Owen for providing this service for the celebration. Citizens can also park in city parking lots along Bardstown Road and walk to the park. Please help out your neighbors with houses around Tyler Park and avoid parking on the adjoining streets.

The TPNA will be serving concessions from 1 p.m. to 7 p.m. that will include pizza by the slice from Pizza Magia!, soft drinks, bottled water, hot dogs, brats, popcorn and homemade baked goods. The annual TPNA fund raiser raffle will be going on all day. Tickets are \$1 each or 6 for \$5. The grand prize this year is \$300 and will be drawn at 6:30 p.m. during the festival. Additional prizes will be drawn throughout the day and include gift certificates from area restaurants and business. There will be as many as 50 prizes drawn. Tickets are available in advance of the festival from TPNA board members or in the park during the festival.

Remember to bring your blankets and chairs! Alcoholic beverages are not permitted in the park.

The Treasures of Tyler Park

I have lived in the Tyler Park Neighborhood since 1985 or almost half of my entire life. Until just a few weeks ago I was under the notion that over that long span of time I had managed to discover or stumble upon every treasure in our neighborhood. But how could I have missed such a majestic tree and right under my very nose? I am embarrassed to admit this, but for the past five years I have lived next door to the most beautiful old American Elm tree in North America. This tree is without equal. The owners have no idea how old the tree is but they estimate it has been there for over 100 years. Once I became aware of this beauty and learned to recognize the shape of its leaves, the sway of its branches, the contour of its trunk I searched for others of its kind. I have been able to identify three thus far. All three appear to be about the same age and were planted along the same alley. I am sure there were many more at one time, but these three are all that remain.

The Elm species originated in Central Asia about 40 million years ago. It spread across the entire Eurasian landmass and finally to North America. Elms can live as long as 300 years and grow up to 115 feet tall and have trunks over 10 feet in diameter. Our Three Elms appear to be close to the maximum dimensions, so I know they have to very old and rare. Dutch elm disease has decimated the Elm population over the past 100 years. The disease got its name because seven Dutch women scientists discovered it in 1917. Our three Elms show no sign of ill health.

It is estimated that at its peak there were 77 million elms in North America. Today they number less than 30 million. My research on the web indicates that lots of effort by government and good Samaritans across the United States and Canada has been dedicated to the preservation of this magnificent species.

There are many varieties of elms. The American variety is the most common in eastern North America. If anyone in our community would like to know where our three beauties are located please contact one of your board members or attend the next board meeting.

Likewise, if you know of any other elms in Tyler Park please contact your board.

2004 National Preservation Conference in Louisville

Register Now! Louisville, Kentucky will host the 2004 National Preservation Conference September 28 - October 3, sponsored by the National Trust for Historic Preservation. The 26th annual conference will offer innovative ideas and inspiration for people saving America's historic places and revitalizing communities, with more than 50 educational and 30 field sessions throughout Louisville, Central Kentucky and southern Indiana focusing on the conference theme "Restore America: Communities at a Crossroads." Topics will include neighborhood revitalization and housing, commercial revitalization, organizational development, smart growth and regional planning, cultural landscapes, transportation issues, historic sites and heritage tourism. Statewide partners are the Kentucky Heritage Council/State Historic Preservation Office, Preservation Kentucky, Inc., Louisville Metro Government and Historic Landmarks Foundation of Indiana. Update on ABC Hearing with Bearno's

On June 15, two TPNA representatives spoke at a hearing organized by Alcohol Beverage Control concerning noise ordinance violations cited by ABC officers in September of 2003 at the Bearno's on Bardstown Road. The cited violations were the results of repeated phone calls by the TPNA representatives to police dispatch (574-7111) during 2003. At the ABC hearing a fine of \$750 was levied against Bearno's, along with an order to cease all amplified outdoor music until corrective measures, as determined by an acoustics engineer, can be made. According to the metro noise ordinance, noise that is plainly audible from a distance of 50 feet or more from its source is a violation and can be subject to a fine of \$50 to \$500 for each occurrence.

Our District Resource Officer has recommended that residents call the police dispatch number directly (574-7111) in situations requiring police attention or presence, and that callers request a police report especially in situations involving violence or property damage. It requires constant, patient vigilance to ensure that we maintain peace and safety in our neighborhood. We're grateful for the support and interest shown by our police force and the ABC.

West Nile Virus Remains a Concern

The Health Department and Metropolitan Sewer District have received more than 1,100 calls from citizens with mosquito concerns. So far this year only two birds have tested positive for the West Nile virus.

Agencies such as MSD and Public Works Department are continuing this year to use larvacide briquettes to treat hundreds of locations throughout the community where standing water can become mosquito breeding grounds.

Eliminate mosquito-breading places around your house to guard against West Nile. Remember - some mosquitoes need less than 1/4 inch of water to breed. Water can collect in places you might not think of. So make sure your yard doesn't become a mosquito breeding ground - eliminate all standing water.

Tips to avoid West Nile:

Get rid of old tires. Water collects in the inside and breeds mosquitoes.

Empty birdbaths and pet water bowls every couple days.

Clean your gutters so they don't hold water.

Empty your children's wading pools every couple of days and store them upside down so they don't collect water.

And don't forget to get the water out of low spots on tarps and swimming pool covers.

In places where you can't eliminate the standing water, such as in ornamental ponds, use products now available at stores and at home and garden centers to inhibit mosquito breeding.


