Come to the Annual Tyler Park Festival


Our traditional fall festival will be held on Sunday, September 30 starting at 2:00 PM and ending at 7:00 PM.

The homeowners enjoyed meeting and talking with the attendees, and everyone thought it was a huge success because it showcased our neighborhood so beautifully.


Two neighbors won door prizes, courtesy of The Plant Kingdom.

Tyler Park Master Plan and Upgrades

Along with New York's Central Park, Boston's "jeweled necklace" of parks, and Louisville's own Cherokee, Iroquois, and Shawnee Parks, the Frederick law Olmsted firm designed our very own Tyler Park. The Metro Louisville Parks Department and the Olmsted Conservancy have been working together to maintain the Olmstead parks original design. Due to budget limitations, it has become the responsibility of neighborhoods or individuals to motivate master plans and initiate funding for those plans. Last year TPNA's President Mike Gramig and then board member Tomese Buthod met with Kate Chandler of the Olmsted Conservancy to determine the feasibility of a master Plan for Tyler Park. The cost was approximately \$25,000, which would include an historical analysis of the original design for the park, a current status analysis, and a proposal for future improvements and maintenance.

The TPNA Board was somewhat overwhelmed by the price tag and at the same time saw a need for a Master Plan. Discussion ensued. Do we commit money for a Master Plan or do we begin to replace worn park items? In the mean time Tom Owen continued to diligently prioritize Tyler Park needs. Our tennis courts are being resurfaced mid September. This along with the completion of the wall along Baxter has consumed much of the Board's attention.


On July 31, Sarah Lynn Cunningham, John and Julie French, and Joan Dubay met with Martha Berner from Metro Parks. Our goal was to identify some immediate financially feasible upgrades to Tyler Park.

Presently Tyler Park sports a conglomerate of three styles of benches, many of which are in desperate need of replacement. The benches that have been most recently replaced were installed by Metro Park's maintenance. We learned from Martha that there is now a single style of bench that may be used in an Olmstead park. This bench is a replica of the original New York Central Park bench. It is made of a tropical hardwood "ipe" and is not stained or polyurethaned. The wood is allowed to gray naturally. It is so hard it cannot be carved.

The cost of one bench installed with a soil/hardened soil pad is \$1,120; the benches would be handicapped accessible. Martha suggested we might consider trash receptacles that compliment the bench designs. Receptacles are \$848.00 each plus installation. The receptacles are anchored, have a liner inside and a lid with an eight-inch opening.

We determined a need for 19-22 new benches. Martha mentioned a suite of improvements, like a bench / pad/ receptacle/ base group to demonstrate possible changes and show the neighborhood how the installations would look. At the August 23rd TPNA Board meeting, members agreed to support this approach. John French, Martha Berner, and a Park Operations member are meeting within the next several weeks to flesh out some ideas for the spray pool, playground, and picnic area in the lower park.

Even without a Master Plan these particular benches and receptacles are Olmstead standards and could be moved in the future. Individuals or businesses may be willing to donate a bench. We came away with an enthusiasm and renewed love for Tyler Park. Please stop by the Park improvement table at the TPNA Picnic and let us know what you think.




Brightside Community-Wide Cleanup



Windsor Place Letters

Several months ago, Metro Council member Tom Owen announced at a regular TPNA meeting that big plans were afoot for the Bardstown Road / Windsor Place intersection.

Along with sidewalk replacement, the intersection was to be "pinched" to make it smaller, thus slowing traffic making turns onto Windsor Place and making a shorter, safer space for pedestrians to negotiate. The proposal immediately raised concerns about preserving the inlaid metal letters spelling out "Windsor Place" on both corners.

More recently, Tom arranged a meeting with TPNA board members and project staff on June 1 at the intersection. Earlier that same day, we board members were very concerned to see that all the letters had been jack-hammered out of the walk on the south corner, but we were relieved to hear that they had been removed intact and were undergoing restoration for proposed reuse. As I write this (June 30), our options include: re-embed the original letters on both corners; re-embed the letters that can be salvaged so that at least one corner would have original letters; buy custom-made replacement letters (not likely, at a total cost of \$6000!); buy new letters "off the shelf" install pavers with engraved letters on both corners; install an engraved, upright marker on one or both corners. It all depends on how well the original letters survive the concrete-cleaning process.

Our thanks go to Tom Owen for the 'heads up' on this project and on the meeting, his assistant Terra Long for her interest and help, and to the project personnel for their consideration and extra work required. Not all of the letters date back to the establishment of the Windsor Place subdivision, but ours is only one of two city streets with such inlaid letters and we were concerned with their preservation.

Early July update: we have been informed that the original letters have been cleaned up and will be reinstalled on both corners, along with the proposed curb cuts, trees, and a bench.

August update: the letters have been reinstalled and have been edged with pavers. Two new trees have been planted on the south corner, and the area will be receiving a new bench soon.
