

The View from the Bridge

Spring has been a busy time in Tyler Park Neighborhood. In this issue of The Bridge Rebecca Watson recounts the good times had by all at the annual Tyler Park Easter Egg Hunt and the St. Paddy's Day Parade. We had a large turn out of children for the very popular egg hunt, and although the Tyler Park Leprechauns were thoroughly soaked, we all had a great time in the St. Paddy's Parade. Thank you Rebecca for coordinating these activities.

Tuesday, May 13 and Tuesday May 20 (primary election day) were Front Porch Tuesdays. For those who may not know about this activity, on the odd numbered evenings from 6 PM until approximately dusk, the odd side of the street (I'm definitely on the 'odd' side!) hosts on their porches, and on the even numbered evening, the even side of the street hosts. Our 8th District Metro Councilman, Tom Owen started this event as a way to encourage neighbor interaction and improve awareness of and identity with our neighborhoods.

Also in this edition of The Bridge please note Terry Redden's article on the Tyler Park Garden Tour to be held on Saturday, June 21. This is a great opportunity to discover the many attractive gardens and yards in the Tyler Park Neighborhood.

On a more serious note, in the last couple of months the neighborhood has seen a spike in vandalism in the form of spray painting of garages and the Park structures. I personally have documented approximately two dozen properties and a very serious incident in which the Tyler Park Bridge, shelter, and the bottom of the children's pool have been covered with graffiti.

In addition there have a number of reports of vehicle break-ins and a few homes also.

It is very important for us all to take every precaution to prevent these occurrences and to be vigilant of our homes and those of our neighbors. In order to reduce this activity, we are working with LMPD, to reorganize the Neighborhood Block Watch structure in Tyler Park. Neighborhood Block Watch

Response to our efforts to re-establish a Neighborhood Block Watch program for the Tyler Park area have been gratifying. We have at least 15 residents ready to help out and, with our growing graffiti problem and the expected rising crime rates that seem to come with warmer weather, our timing appears to be perfect. Our thanks go to Goddard resident, Ava Fox, for speaking about the program at a recent TPNA meeting and to all of you who have expressed an interest. We will be working with Ava and the local police representatives soon and will keep you informed of our progress.

TPNA President Mike Gramig has offered to help set up a demonstration block watch along Windsor Place in order to get the program rolling. Please let us know at info@tylerpark.org if you are interested in helping with the program or in getting more information about it. One of our best anticrime efforts as well as a major community-strengthening project is continuing communication among residents, and the Neighborhood Block Watch will be a huge help.

From what we have heard, the Goddard Avenue residents already have an admirable block watch program of their

own; it even "saved" a resident who needed a fresh lime on Christmas Day and posted the need on the street's site!



Tyler Park/Brightside Cleanup on March 29

Present for the early-morning work were Doug Thrasher, Mike Gramig, and John and Julie French. We shoveled mud that had been deposited by the recent rain and runoff from the park's hills and picked up fallen tree limbs and litter from the grounds.

In a surprise move, we also cleaned out two of the park's drains because they had obviously not handled the recent rains very well. We fished numerous plastic bottles and about a dozen tennis balls from one drain, plus several piles of mud and dirt, but later noted that the next rain was still too much for the drain to handle.

The upcoming Master Plan for Tyler Park, under the auspices of the Olmsted Conservancy, will look into correcting the drainage problems in the park as well as all landscaping and park "furniture". 
Report Graffiti Problems


The Tyler Park Neighborhood has uffered numerous graffiti problems recently, most notably in the park itself (tunnel and restroom walls) and in the alleys between Windsor Place and Tyler Parkway and Windsor Place and Rosewood. All offenses should be reported to Police Dispatch (574-7111) so that we can maintain a "paper trail" of the offenses.

Our District Regional Officer, Jeff Artman, reports to us at our regular TPNA meetings concerning all crimes within our area, and he is regularly made aware of the graffiti. He has told us that the police have a graffiti expert who can often identify the vandals, especially when they use "tags" that serve as identification. Short of constant monitoring of our alleys and park in person or by video, there appears to be little that we can do other than regular and quick reporting of all offenses.

Keith's Hardware, located on Bardstown Road just outside our neighborhood's boundary, carries a product called Jasco Premium Paint and Epoxy Remover. It's a spray-on compound (ironically) that, with a little scrubbing, can then be hosed off and reportedly works very well, even on previously unpainted brick. I hope you don't need it, but it appears to be one temporary solution to the problem. It costs \$8.95 for a large spray can. Tell Keith that TPNA sent ya'!




Check Your Mailing Label!
