We often hear about how much more convenient shopping is today, but is it? Fifty years ago in the Tyler Park area people could have their groceries delivered or shop at a number of stores nearby. Part of the Tyler Park History Project has been to interview people about life around Tyler Park in the old days, and one of the questions asked was

about shopping for food.

Audrey Reiss Crews said of her family on Edenside, "We never went to the store." Grocer, Lee Shore in the Haymarket area, called her mother every morning and took the delivery order. Herberger's grocery on Bardstown Road also delivered. Mrs. Florence Nofsinger, who grew up on Cherokee Road, said, "For many years when I was a girl, Ehrmann's was there, and we'd order a quart of ice cream and they'd send it right over." Ehrmann's was in the 1100 block of Bardstown Road before it moved to Mid City Mall. The bakery also delivered charlotte russe. a special Louisville dessert of ladyfingers and custard, in a glass bowl, which was picked up later. They still make charlotte russe in a glass bowl. Norma Ryan told us that her family went to Pepper's Bakery on Bonny-castle and Bardstown Road to buy bread everyday. Later the Donaldson's Bakery wagon circulated throughout the area with a large selection of bread and pastries.

There were many grocery and drug stores. A Steiden's Supermarket was next to Cole's Drugstore on Eastern Parkway at Baxter where Decorator Paint and Wallpaper is now, and Ron Swikert, the carpet man at Decorator used to be a soda jerk at Cole Drug. There were also a number of grocery stores on Bardstown Road: one at Edenside where Parrot Cleaners is; one at Bonny-castle which was a major shopping area; the A&P which moved to Mid City Mall was near Grinstead; and there was a small store at Highland Avenue but not where the gorcery store is now. That area was taken up by the streetcar barn.
