

PARK GETS NEW LOOK

NEW PLAY EQUIPMENT

A shinny pole, a set of handwalking bars, a space ladder, a wave slide, a dome climber, and three safety swings (with three more to come) were installed in Tyler Park on October 19, 1979 by the Metropolitan Parks and Recreation Department. The purchase and installation of new equipment have been TPNA's special projects for 1979. The goal was realized through the cooperative efforts of the neighborhood and city government.

Funding for the \$1,600 worth of play equipment demonstrated the cooperative nature of the endeavor. A \$500 donation by Helen Sprawls, past TPNA President, launched the project. The TPNA board added \$300 from its special project fund. In April 1979, \$800 of Community Match Funds were approved by the Board of Alderman. In September 1979, an additional \$575 grant from Community Match Funds was received to equal a TPNA commitment of \$275 in actual money and \$300 in labor to relocate the tot lot at a safer distance

from Tyler Park Drive in Spring 1980.

REVITALIZATION

Tyler Park's old play equipment has colorful new paint. There are new park signs and less glass, weeds, and debris. All of this happened the weekend of Oct. 20-21 and area residents provided the labor. A total of 137 "nerson hours" of labor was applied in the park by volunteers. Metro-Parks has done an excellent job this year of mowing grass, removing litter, and maintaining the facilities in Tyler Park. However, due to a lack of manpower, this department cannot do the "hand labor" necessary to keep the park in top shape.

TRASH DISPOSAL

TPNA's Fall Cleaning Project included three dumpsters located in Mid-City Mall's parking lot for area residents to dispose of trash. All three dumpsters were overflowing Saturday afternoon. Volunteer labor and a pick-up truck were enlisted to remove several loads to the city incinerator.

The city incinerator, 636 Meri-weather Ave., is open to city residents free of charge daily from 3 p.m. to 10 p.m. and on Sunday from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. Combustible articles should be separated from the non-combustible. For more information call 587-3587.

LEAF PICKUP

The City Sanitation Department will begin its annual "Leaf Pickup" Program on November 13. Bagged leaves will be picked up on Tuesdays in the Tyler Park area. You may also deposit bagged leaves at the Joe Creason Park in the parking lot behind the tennis center or at the Cresent Hill Park in the lot beside the swimming pool. Sticks cut in 4 ft. lengths and tied into bundles may be placed with your garbage on regular pickup days. Try to get your alleys and sidewalks cleared for winter by using these city services.

ALLEY MAINTENANCE

Overgrowth and litter in Tyler Park alleys are presenting problems. Garbage trucks and other vehicles have difficulty traveling these alleys. The appearance is unsightly. Such conditions can harbor rodents. Residents are responsible for maintenance at the rear of their property to the middle of the alley.

Block captains were encouraged to organize alley cleanups during the TPNA Fall Cleanup. Pam Whitman reports that the Windsor alley from Baxter to Mossrose was cleaned of debris and overhanging limbs at that time. We would like to know what others accomplished.
