
**Please join us for the 10th annual

Ground has officially been broken at Tyler Park on the Restoration Project! It was officially kicked-off by Mayor Fisher, the Olmsted Parks Conservancy, Louisville Parks and Recreation, the Tyler Park Neighborhood Association, and a slew of neighbors (including a few four-legged ones) on Tuesday, May 7th. It was a gorgeous morning in Tyler Park and a bevy of journalists were there to provide coverage of the event. We will all need to bear with the inconveniences of the construction in the park for the next months, but it will be worth it! With that said, now is a good time to seize the opportunity to be part of the restoration effort yourself. The Olmsted Parks Conservancy is starting Friends groups with several Olmsted Parks in Louisville, including Tyler Park. The mission of the Friends groups are to improve and activate parks by communicating and collaborating with the community. In other words, The Olmsted Parks Conservancy will provide an advisory role to a Friends of Tyler Park group while helping to improve conditions and programs in the park and strengthen the community. They have already helped to schedule a "Bike-In Movie Night" (save the date for October 19th) and will procure a stage for for the Jazz Fest in September since our usual spot will be under construction. They are encouraging people in Tyler Park to work with them to provide input on what we want our park to be, and will help us achieve it. Construction Begins on \$1.1 million Tyler Park Restoration Project

On Tuesday May 7, 2019 – Olmsted Parks Conservancy, Louisville Parks and Recreation, Mayor Greg Fischer, Councilman Brandon Coan, and Tyler Park Neighborhood Association kicked off construction for the \$1.1 million restoration project in Tyler Park. The groundbreaking ceremony was held on the east side of the bridge, in front of the historic tennis courts.

“We are all pleased to see the start of this project as it will greatly improve the park for the neighborhood and its visitors,” stated Layla George, President and CEO of Olmsted Parks Conservancy. “This project is made possible because of the generous support from donors through our Campaign for Extraordinary Parks, Mayor Greg Fischer, and Councilman Brandon Coan.”

The Tyler Park Neighborhood Association has helped fund park improvements over the last few years, including a new walkway on the northeast side, installation of more than 10 park benches and planting of many trees and shrubs. Feedback from the Association was essential to the development of the restoration plan.

“The Tyler Park Neighborhood Association is thrilled that renovations are beginning on our beloved, historic park,” said Kristen Millwood, President of the Tyler Park Neighborhood Association, when asked about the project. “These renovations will help keep our park a vibrant space for generations to come with some much-needed updates that respect the unique character of Tyler Park.”

Construction will start on the east side of the bridge, where the two historic tennis courts are being repaired, resurfaced and re-fenced. This section of the project is set to be completed this June.

Scheduled to be completed this fall, construction on the west side of the bridge will include:

- Moving the existing playground and sprayground areas and equipping with modern features;
- Constructing a new restroom building;
- Adding a natural area playground;
- Installing new picnic tables and benches;
- And adding parking spaces to improve accessibility.

In the last phase of the project, improvements will be made on the east side of the bridge to:

- Repurpose the four-tennis court set to feature two tennis courts, one half-court basketball court and two pickleball courts;
- Install a rain garden and infiltration basin to address drainage issues;
- Add new picnic tables and benches;
- And improve existing walking paths.

Future improvements to Tyler Park, outside of the restoration project, include the installation of a wheelchair ramp connecting the east and west side of the park, making it easier and safer to get from one side of the park to the other. The ramp is currently included in the Mayor’s recommended budget for the 2019-2020 fiscal year and could be added later this year if approved. The Tyler Park Master Plan also includes a 25-person pavilion which is not funded at this time.



Still Looking for Trees

Our 2016 fall newsletter included the picture on the right, from a 1937 aerial survey. The point of the article was the tree canopy lost since the original photo, largely caused by development, storms, and insects. The article closed by noting that, in the picture “Most of our homes, on every street, have at least one tree” and posing the challenge “go outside and look for your tree. Do you have one?”

We answered the challenge by using an MSD reforestation grant to plant 23 trees in 2016 on private property, 53 more in 2017 and 2018, and 44 trees in the Tyler Park, for a total of 117 new trees.

The challenge has continued. The Emerald Ash Borer devastated the trees in the park and on many residential streets. We lost trees as well to old age, disease, and other causes. Without the MSD grants, our canopy would be in decline. So we intend to continue our reforestation with a 2019 campaign.



Our campaigns operate within rules and budget set by MSD and regulations set by the Metro Division of Community Forestry. For example, MSD limits the number of small trees we can plant because the aim of the grant program is to plant large trees whose root systems will reduce runoff. Forestry regulations are commonsense, like keeping trees that would drop large or messy fruit or heavy nuts away from the right of ways; and prohibiting invasive trees like the Chinese Elm.

We ask property owners to contribute a nominal amount per tree and to commit in writing to keep the tree healthy and allow inspections during the period specified by our grant with MSD. Trees that have died or that have been removed within the inspection period must be replaced. The property owner is responsible for replacement caused by neglect or removal.

Details will likely change. Metro budget issues may bring drastic change. Both MSD and Forestry have been continuously improving what they do each year since the grants began, and we have been learning our own lessons along the way.

At this point we are simply asking you to participate. We will need volunteers in the next month to go door to door encouraging property owners to plant new trees. We will need volunteers in the fall to help get the trees in the ground. TPNA will need help administering the program. Mostly, the Tyler Park neighborhood needs people to invest in its future by planting trees now.


